# Bowls Report

#### December 2017

The RSL Sunbury Bowlers' Group had their AGM on 15<sup>th</sup> November. Our Sub-Branch president attended the meeting. John East was elected chairman and John Welsh re-appointed as secretary. Copies of the Group's Sub-Committee current Guidelines were handed out, discussed and implemented.

T he Group's financial situation was discussed and it was agreed that a request should be made to the Sub-Branch for a \$100 grant for miscellaneous expenses such as registration fees and the like. This request was approved at the Sub-Branch meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> December.

It was also agreed that the Group should seek to run a fund-raising BBQ which has been assigned to the Sub-Branch, with the lion's share of the proceeds being made available for the bowlers. This received a favourable reception at the Sub-Branch meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> December, and the matter is being pursued by John Welsh and Deb Williams.

The Sunbury team is currently sixth on the 12-team ladder in the NW RSL Pennant Bowls Friday-morning competition. After Christmas, the draw is to be split into two divisions of six. Our players are keen to remain in the top half and battle it out with the "big boys" rather than to be relegated to the bottom half. Stay tuned!

A member of the NW committee approached us a few weeks ago and complained about our uniforms. The Rules allow either white or coloured shirts; some teams wear whites and some have coloureds. The coloured shirts are more striking than the older white shirts, and many of the RSL teams are now in coloureds. The shirts must have the RSL badge.

Unfortunately, we had some players in white and some in our Sunbury BC shirt, which does not have the RSL badge. So, we had to do something or get fined!

Everybody has agreed to temporarily wear white whilst we make enquiries about new coloured shirts. Some options at this stage are:

- 1. Sunbury shirt with iron-on badge.
- 2. New simpler design shirt, with iron-on badge. Iron-on badges are preferred to printed RSL logos because the former have more detail.

The new shirts matter was raised at the Sub-Branch meeting on 11<sup>th</sup> December. The availability of iron-on badges was also discussed at that meeting. The Bowlers' Group is to make a written submission to the Sub-Branch for financial help.



We used to go to weddings, Football games and lunches.. Now we go to funeral homes And after-funeral brunches.


We used to have hangovers, From parties that were gay. Now we suffer body aches And while the night away.

Each group was asked to give four reasons for its recommendation.


The men's group decided that "computer" should be of the feminine gender, because;


- 1. No one but their creator understands their internal logic'

Here is a true adventure story about two young men from Sydney who, in 1929, decided to take a holiday with a difference and ride right round Australia on a motorcycle. This was a feat that had never been done before, which was not surprising as travelling conditions in the outback in those days were often hard and hazardous. It was not an expedition to be undertaken lightly.

With the boundless optimism of youth they bought a 7/9hp FD magneto model Harley-Davidson motor-cycle - the grandfather of today's big twins - fitted a stout wooden box on the sidecar chassis to house their gear and the relief rider, and set out to conquer the continent with just sixty pounds in the kitty and neither a watch nor compass between them.


As the Depression was already looming, they were unable to interest any sponsors in their venture and the only support they received was a jumper apiece from the Harley-Davidson agents.

Seven weeks and over 15,000 km later they returned travel-strained and triumphant. Not only had they achieved their goal and been the first to circumnavigate the continent by motorcycle but they had done so in record time for any motorised vehicle. On the way the two young pioneers had endured just about every imaginable hardship and danger and survived through sheer guts and resourcefulness. A great tale of men and their machine: of courage and mateship in Australia nearly 70 years ago. It makes fascinating reading today.



### **▲** Victoria Barracks



Victoria Barracks was the administrative headquarters for the Australian Army but to ensure the close coordination of the three services necessary to the war effort, the Barracks also became the administrative headquarters of the Royal Australian Navy and Royal Australian Air Force.

As well, accommodation needed to be found at the Barracks for Ministers and staff travelling to meetings of the War Cabinet and the Advisory War Council in Melbourne.

Located on St Kilda Road in Melbourne, Australia, Victoria Barracks Melbourne is of architectural and historical significance as one of the most impressive 19th century government buildings in Victoria, Australia

The earliest buildings at Victoria Barracks were built by soldiers in the late 1850s, with the original bluestone buildings being constructed between 1856 and 1872. A large extension was made to officers' quarters in 1917 but with the growth of service personnel and civilian staff at the beginning of the Second World War, space was at a premium.

In 1940, a five story red brick extension - 'N Block' - was erected behind the original 'C Block' to house the administrative headquarters of the Navy and the Air Force.

#### The War Cabinet room

The most significant room in the Victoria Barracks was the specially fitted out War Cabinet Room at the other end of the corridor from the offices of the War Cabinet Secretariat.
