Voting help is available at the Library. It seems a bit full on, but worth the effort. I hope.



FIRST ON THE BEAT

On July 31st, 1917 Madge Connor and Elizabeth Beers were appointed Victoria's first police women. Officially, the women were police agents and had no powers of arrest or uniform. Beers was later replaced by Ellen 'Nell' Davidson, a staunch Salvation Army member devoted to rooting out social evils.

By 1923 Mary Cox and Ellen Cook joined their ranks. A year later the four women were officially sworn in with full constabulary rights and powers, including powers to arrest and pension rights.

FROM VOTES TO JOES

By 1908 the suffragette movement had won Victorian women the right to vote - next on the list was the right to equal work. Women were already clamouring for involvement in police work; in 1913 a letter appeared in the Argus asking Victoria Police 'What would you think of giving a lady a trial?' (Argus 5 Feb 1913, p 12)

Two years later NSW and SA became the first Australian states to employ policewomen. Pressure on the Victorian Government to follow suit soon came from women's rights groups, including the National Council of Women. They argued that policewomen could perform welfare work related to children and at-risk women. In reality, women had already acted as undercover agents for some years, but the idea of policewomen was far from popular.

One Inspector voiced his concerns to the Chief Commission that 'Women police would be of little if any use' (Public Record Office Victoria, VPRS 3992, U1951) But the idea had already caught hold. In 1916 the government decided to appoint two policewomen at a salary of 90 pounds per annum: half that of a policeman. The spark was lit.

WOMEN'S WORK

The original policewomen were tasked with ensuring the wellbeing and welfare of the cities' women and children. Although no small task, the women rose to it with pluck and courage.

Their official duties were limited to what was deemed women's work, including investigating houses of 'ill-fame' and 'women of ill-repute', attending to abandoned babies and children, patrolling slum areas and assisting female sexual assault victims

Although Chief Commissioner Nicholson had publically declared "I doubt greatly whether they could prove of much assistance in the detection and prevention of crime" (The Argus 22 Aug, 1924), policewomen were proving otherwise. By the 1930s policewomen were regularly conducting investigations into major crimes including illegal liquor, drugs, gambling and robbery, sometimes under-cover.





Horses to Horsepower

1958 Ariel Square Four Mark II motorcycle

At 1000cc, the Ariel was the most powerful motorcycle of its time. Originally introduced for the 1956 Olympic Games Royal Tour, by the end of the decade Ariels were gradually decommissioned.

Although fitted with an electric siren, there was no radio communication, and in the event of an emergency the rider would need to find a public telephone.

Acquired in 2011, this motorcycle has been faithfully restored to its former glory.

Darby's Lunch at The Australian Club

During August each year, one of the oldest and most elite clubs in Melbourne, The Australian Club commemorates VP Day by inviting their members, and representatives from selected ESOs to attend a special "Victory in the Pacific Luncheon".

This Year's theme was to be navel battles in the Pacific during World War Two, particularly, the 1942 sinking of the Australian County Class Cruiser, HMAS Canberra, and the exploits of her replacement, HMAS Shropshire.

It just so happens, that Sunbury RSL's esteemed member, 94 (almost 95) year old Darby Munro, is a veteran who actually served on HMAS Shropshire throughout that period. The Australian Club, on being informed of Darby's experience and availability unhesitatingly offered a special invitation for him to attend the occasion.



Wednesday 15th August,2018, Darby, accompanied by his daughter Kaye Nicholls and Sunbury RSL members, Geoff and Noela Rose, arrived at the Australia Club in Williams Street, Melbourne to partake in prelunch refreshments and mingle with the other invited guests. Darby was introduced to official Naval

Historian, Lt Cdr Des Woods, who was to later to present a illustrated lecture on this year's subject. Des was very impressed to meet Darby and spoke with him about the 'true history' of events—and was most appreciative of Darby's input.





On moving to the Dining Room, it was noted that Darby Munro and his entourage were to be seated at Table ONE. During the formal welcome and introductions Darby was singled out for his wartime experience and for being a person who had participated in the events to be discussed during the day's lecture. Darby stood to receive enthusiastic applause from all present.

Later, during his talk, Lt Cdr Woods made several references to Darby, and even sought his confirmation on a number of points.

The meal and liquid refreshments were very tasty and most enjoyable. A good day was had by all.


