Australia 1957

- 19 January The last edition of The Argus newspaper is published.
- 20 January GTV-9 television station is officially opened in Melbourne
- 6 May In Melbourne Tonight, TV-Series 1957–1970 (GTV-9's first major production)
- July The Bega bombing occurs in Bega, New South Wales when Senior Constable Kenneth Desmond Coussens (31), his wife Elizabeth (34) and 7-month-old son Bruce are instantly killed by a bomb placed on their home's veranda. The house was demolished by the explosion at about 2 AM. 8-year-old Roger McCampbell, Coussens step-son, survived. A six-gallon metal cream container filled with 240 sticks of gelignite, stolen from a mine, was placed there by Myron Bertram Kelly. Coussens dealt with Kelly regarding traffic offences and issued him sev eral traffic fines. Kelly appears to have become angered because Coussens issued further fines and defect notices regarding Kelly's tractor and rotary hoe. On 6 December 1957 Justice McClemens sentenced Kelly to life imprisonment for the 3 murders.[1]
- September Hobart has its wettest day on record with 156.2 millimetres as a result of a slow-moving low pressure system redeveloping over the Tasman Sea[2]
- October Australian National Airways (ANA) is merged with Ansett to form Ansett-ANA.

1788	5	In a despatch to the under-secretary of state, Evan Nepean, Phillip recorded the rations for marines and male convicts. For seven days each received 7 pounds of bread or in lieu thereof 7 pounds of flour, 7 pounds of beef or in lieu thereof pork, 3 pins of pease, 6 ounces of butter, 1 pound of flour or in lieu thereof 12 pounds of rice. The women received two-thirds of this amount and the children generally had one-third although some received as much as the women.

Jane Fawthrop Tyers

Jane Fawthrop Tyers was born in Portland Victoria on 21st March 1877, the youngest of nine children of Emily and Thomas Bennett. Her father came from Derbyshire England to Portland in 1854, with his uncle establishing a successful tailoring business and later a comfortable home for his family.

When Jane was 2 years old, her mother died. Her father died 10 years later, so 12 year old Jane was sent away to Girton College in Bendigo to obtain her education and probably her early independence.

Jane entered the School of Nursing at the Austin Hospital Melbourne, and graduated as a general nurse in 1909. After obtaining her Mental Nursing Certificate in 1910, Jane was employed at Sunbury Hospital for the Insane as a Charge Nurse, and then Acting Matron. Jane's and colleague, Ethel Tracey Richardson, previously matron at Sunbury, had joined the Army Nursing Service in 1914, and became Matron in Chief, Australian Army Nursing Service, and Australia Military Forces. She encouraged Jane to join up the war was not expected to last very long and the experience would be invaluable.

Jane Tyers enlisted on the 10th August 1915, Unit No.1 Australia General Hospital, A.I.F, appointed as a member of the Australian Army Nursing Service on 17th August 1915 in the grade of Sister. She embarked one week later 24th August 1915, on the "Morea", stopping at Suez, but travelling on to Alexandria. On 17th June 1916, Jane was admitted to 3rd Australian General Hospital, Heliopolis, with gastroenteritis, and "discharged to duty" on 20th June1916, her only illness recorded. She returned to Australia from Egypt on H.M. "Port Sydney", "detailed for transport duty and struck off strength". Leaving Suez on board nursing staff on 24th June 1916 and disembarking in Melbourne on 7th July 1916.

After the war Jane returned to her position as Matron of the Sunbury Mental Hospital and remained there for a year or so, but then accepted the position of Matron at the new Mont Park Mental Hospital which initially was to provide for mentally ill returned defence force personnel. Later she worked at the Queen Elizabeth Aged Care Hospital in Ballarat and was promoted to night supervisor, a position she held for nearly four years.

At the age of seventy Jane decided to retire and moved back to Sunbury. She enjoyed being back in Sunbury, and often drove with a friend, Billy Aitken, to the races at Moonee Valley on Saturdays.

Jane was diagnosed with mature age diabetes some years previously, her health started to deterio-

rate after she turned eighty. She was admitted to Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital and had a below the knee leg amputation, after which she was determined to walk with a prosthetic leg. She did master this skill, but some month later she was admitted again and passed away in June 1960, at the age of 83 years.

Jane gave her entire life to nursing and caring for people.

Her name appears on the Sunbury Cenotaph in Stawell Street Sunbury.

Trivial to some

Australia's oldest surviving brewery, the Cascade Brewery in Hobart, Tasmania, is still operating almost 200 years after its establishment in 1824.

Within 70 years, many of Australia's longstanding breweries had been created, including the Coopers Brewery in 1862, the Carlton Brewery in 1864, and the Fosters brewery in 1887, which produced Australia's first lager.

In 1878, brothers Nicholas and Edward Fitzgerald, moved their entire brewing operation from Castlemaine in Victoria to Brisbane. Hence, the Castlemaine Perkins brewery was born, known today as the home of XXXX.

Following Australia's federation in 1901, a new Beer and Excise Act was formed by the Federal Government, which led to the regulation of beer brewing and sales.

Home brewing was determined to be illegal and the beer sector began to transform as 16 of Sydney's 21 breweries began to shut their doors.

Within a short time, the remaining breweries in Australia looked to consolidation. 1907 saw the merger of five Melbourne breweries to form Carlton & United Breweries. As with most sectors, over the last century continuing consolidation to achieve economies of scale has led to greater concentration in beer production - but, most importantly, the brew remains

Step 1

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Grease and flour an 8-inch round cake pan.

Step 2

Mix strawberries and 3 tablespoons brown sugar together in a bowl.

Step 3

Mix flour, 1/3 cup brown sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt in a separate large bowl. Whisk yogurt, melted butter, vanilla extract, and egg in a third bowl. Stir yogurt mixture, alternating with milk, into flour mixture until just moistened. Spoon 2/3 of the batter into the prepared pan; spread strawberry mixture evenly over batter. Top with remaining batter. Sprinkle almonds over batter.

Step 4

Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted in the middle of the cake comes out clean, about 40 minutes. Let cool in pan atop a wire rack for 10 minutes. Run a knife around the edge of the pan before transferring cake to a serving platter.


