

Peter Mac arrived mid afternoon and brought out his "truck rim" fireplace, and got it going.


Gary kept bringing in firewood from around the block for 'processing'in the fireplace.





## **What Australia has**



Under LAND 400 Phase 2 the ASLAV is slated to be replaced by a new Armoured Reconnais-



The Army has ordered a total of 1,052 Bushmaster Protected Mobility Vehicles to date, with deliveries commencing in mid-2005.



The Army has ordered 1,100 Hawkei Protected Mobility Vehicles – Light (PMV-L) to partially replace the Land Rover Perentie. It is smaller and around half the weight of the Bushmaster. It is able to be carried underslung by the CH-47F Chinook helicopter.



5,000+ Land Rovers were originally acquired as a fleet of light duty vehicles for transporting stores, equipment and personnel. As of 2017 fewer than 1,500 remain in service



A derivative of the Austrian Steyr AUG STG-77 assault rifle. It is the ADF's standard individual weapon, which replaced the L1A1 SLR and the M16A1 rifle from front-line service in the late 1980s. The weapon is manufactured under licence in Australia by Thales Australia (formerly Australian Defence Industries Ltd). Enhanced F88 (EF88), The Latest variant to improve modularity featuring extended accessories rail, a fixed barrel and bolt catch release. 1RAR will begin to re-equip with the EF88 from June 2015 with a wider roll out from 2016.[50] The ADF has ordered 30,000 of these rifles an August 2015,[51] 8,500 on 13 July 2020.

- 29 January The Royal Australian Air Force takes delivery of its first two Mirage fighter jets
- 4 February Cyclone Dora strikes north west Queensland
- 10 February Melbourne-Voyager collision: The aircraft carrier HMAS Melbourne and the destroyer HMAS Voyager collide, with the loss of 82 lives
  - March There is a split in the Communist Partu of Australia and the Communist Party of Australia (Marxist-Leninist) is formed
- 8 April The Jackson-Moon-Brisbane oil pipeline opens
- 24 April Melbourne woman Judy Hanrahan becomes the first female teller appointed by the Bank of NSW since World War II
  - June Macquariie University is founded
  - June The Beatles' 1964 world tour of Australia and New Zealand
- 6 July Wareant Officer Class 2, Kevin Conway of the Australian Army Training Team died; he was Australia's first Vietnam War battle casualty.
- 15 July The first edition of The Australian is published in Canberra. It is Australias first national daily newspaper, published by Rupert Murdoch's News Limited.
- 17 July Donald Campbell sets new land speed record of 429 miles per hour in his jet-propelled car "Bluebird" at Lake Eyre
  - August The Tasman Bridge across the Derwent River opens in Hobart.
- 10 Nov. Prime Minister Robert Menzies announces the reintroduction of National Service.
- 31 Dec Donald Campbell sets new water speed record of 276 Miles per hour at Dumbleyung Lake,

#### **INGREDIENTS**

1/2 cup Nestle sweetened condensed milk

100g butter

200g granite biscuits

1 cup desiccated coconut

2tsp grated lemon rind

#### LEMON ICING

2 cups pure icing sugar

20g butter, softened

2 1/2 tablespoonslemon juice

# Lemon Slice

#### **METHOD**

Step 1 Grease a 33cm deep, 15.5cm x25cm slab tin. Line base and sides with paper extending 2cm above edges of pan

Step 2 Place condensed milk and butter in a small saucepan over medium heat. Cook, stiring, 5 minutes or until smooth and combined. Remove from heat.

Step 3 Using a food processor, process biscuits until fine crumbs. Transfer to a bowl. Add coconut and lemon rind. Stir to combine. Add hot butter mixture. Mix well to combine,. Press mixture over thee base of prepared pan. Cover. Refrigerate for 1 1/2 hours or until firm.

Step 4 Make lemon icing: Sift icing sugar into a bowl. Add butter and lemon juice. Beat with a wooden spoon until smooth and combined. Spread icing over slice. Stand at room temperature for 30 minutes or until icing has set.
