

January

The Family Law Act comes into effect, Elizabeth Evatt is sworn in as first Chief Justice of the Family court of Australia.

March

June

Cabinet agrees to a series of changes in the law governing building societies, the temporary suspension of five and then the collapse of two of them.

July

ACTU calls a national 24-hour strike over Medicare charges.

August

29 Australians are evacuated from Peking, China after authorities warn of the possibility of a new powerful earthquake

September

Cigarette and tobacco advertising banned on television and radio.

Blue Hills (ABC) radio comes to an end after 32 years

December

The Royal Australian Navy's fleet of Grumman Tracker aircraft is destroyed by arson at Nowra New South Wales.






This Museum was begun by Ian and Mary Leveridge years ago while having a trucking business in Melbourne.

ANZAC Appeal Badge Sales 2022 - Warning Order



ANZAC Day 2022 is on a Monday.

It is proposed to conduct badge sales starting on Sat 9 Apr and complete sales on Sun 24 Apr. Remy will sell badges at the hall on ANZAC Day.

We do not usually sell on Sundays but Sun 10th and Sun 24th will be optional for those that specifically want to sell, or can only sell, on those days.

Easter is in the middle of this period and **NO** sales are proposed for the whole Easter weekend -15-18 Apr. This is due to other appeals (eg children's Hosp on 15^{th}), some shops closed for most or all weekend (eg Remy's butcher), the significance of Easter to many, and people away (both customers and members; incl myself).

Sales will be conducted at the same 8 locations: Geyers, Evans St (outside Mowatts Butcher), Sunbury Square (outside SpendLess Shoes), Woolies and Big W (Sunbury Plaza), Target, Bunnings, and Rosenthal.

EFTPOS machines have been requested for Sunbury Square, Woolies, Bunnings, and Rosenthal.

The roster is up so get in early to book your favorite location and time. We would like 2 people at each site for safety, to ensure sellers can take breaks and answer calls of nature as required, as well as redundancy if someone cannot attend at the last minute.

Hours of sale are usually 9am to 2pm (that's 0900 – 1400hrs for you Deb). Split shifts are always welcome if you can't do a whole day.

The requirement still remains that all sellers must be fully vaccinated, and Harry must have a copy of proof of vaccination on file.

We will also have the usual suspects roving between sites on most days annoying you, cracking the whip and restocking your trays.

King's Bridge after collapse during testing, Bendigo 1901.

King's Bridge after collapse during testing, Bendigo 1901. One person killed. From the Argus News Paper MIRACULOUS ESCAPE OF OTHERS, BENDIGO, Tuesday. A sensational accident, which unfortunately terminated fatally in the case of Mr. Albert Edward Boldt, the wellknown municipal contractor and wood merchant, of High-street, occurred at about half-past 4 o'clock this afternoon, and the escape of a number of others is nothing short of marvellous. Recently contracts were let to Messrs. Monash and Anderson, representatives in Australia for the Monier bridges, to erect these bridges over several waterways in various streets. The Oakstreet, Golden-square, bridge had been completed, and had withstood satisfactorily all the tests applied, and to-day the second

one, called the King'sbridge, at the lower end of Bridge-street, near the Gasworks, was being submitted to a test. Considerable interest was attached to the trial, as the span of the bridge was much greater than the former one, and Messrs. J. R. Richardson (city surveyor). J. J. Smith (city over-seer), G. T. Read



(assistant surveyor), and Meade (clerk of works) were all present and had adjusted the indicators. Besides these several gentlemen interested in engineering looked on, while there was a large crowd of sightseers. The bridges are made in three sections, each 8ft. wide, and these, as the bridge is completed, become hermetical- J. Swift and was guided by R. ly sealed one to the other. The span of the bridge was 60ft. on the square and 93ft. on the incline. It is computed that there is 100 tons of stuff in each section,

the minimum thickness of cement and metal being 9in. in the centre. The bridge is built to support 25 tons. The method adopted in testing is to put a large steam roller weighing 13 tons over the bridge, and also a steam traction engine of about a similar weight. The steam roller was driven by E. Muir, while the traction engine was driven by James B. Bassett and steered by George J. Brasier. The steam roller had been taken over the bridge a dozen times to

then run back and approached each other a second time. The traction engine was taken up on to the northern section when both engines came to a standstill. Mr. Boldt, who had come down as a spectator, was looking over the parapet, when a warning came from the bystanders that the bridge was coming down, and almost simultaneously the northern section of the bridge collapsed. At the spot there is a height of fully 13ft. to the bed of the creek, and the bystanders were horrified to see the traction engine turn almost completely over. The escape of steam caused by the breakage of the safety-valve assisted in paralysing the onlookers, who rushed pell-mell in all direc-

Mr. Monash, one of the contractors, at once called all of the men together to see if any were missing, but everyone responded to the call. Brasier, who was steering the traction engine, received a shaking, but escaped miraculously. Bassett, who was driving, says that he felt the engine go down suddenly and give a kind of roll, and he remembered nothing until he was scrambling out of the debris. E. J. Swift, the driver of the steam roller, seeing the accident, jumped off his engine, as did Muir, and they escaped. The whole of one wheel of the steam roller was without support and the other partly so, but the nature of the axle prevented it from toppling over. Three young men, named

Mr. Boldt was about 36 years of age and leaves a widow and two children. The news of the accident quickly spread throughout the city, and the scene of the accident was visited by thousands of people.

INGREDIENTS

2 oranges

5cm piece fresh ginger. Pealed and sliced lengthways

2 garlic cloves. Sliced

2 star anise

1.5kg pork neck

1/4 cup treacle

6 baby pac choy, halved

200g snow peas

I this veg oil

I tbls sesame oil

Steamed rice to serve

METHOD

Step | Preheat oven 150C


Line a roasting pan with baking paper

Step2 Arrange orange, ginger, and garlic slices over centre of prepared pan. Add star anise. Place pork on top. Drizzle treacle all over pork. Season with salt and pepper. Bake, turning and basting every hour, for 3 hours or until pork is tender (orange will blacken and caramelize during cooking).

Step3 Arrange pak choy and snow peas around pork.

Drizzle with veg oil. Bake 10 minutes.

Step4 Slice pork. Drizzle with sesame oil. Serve with vege tables and rice. Discard the orange.
