

AUSTRALIA 1980



January

9 January - Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser announces sanctions against the Soviet Union following its invasion of Afghanistan.

17 January – Debbie Wardley becomes Australia's first female pilot to take to the skies when she co-pilots a Fokker Friendship on Ansett Flight 232 on the so-called "milk run" from Alice Springs to Darwin. The flight marks the end of a 15-month legal battle with Ansett Airlines to overcome gender-based discrimination which had prevented her from earlier taking the controls.

24 January - The first section of Melbourne's underground railway loop is opened

February

- 19 February Rock singer Bon Scott of the band AC/DC, at age 33 found dead having slept in parked car in London, UK.
- 21 February A Beech 200 light aircraft crashes at Sydney Airport, killing 13.

March

I March – The federal executive of the Australian Labor Party decides to intervene in the Queensland branch. Most key office-holders are replaced.

25 March – Defence Minister James Killen announces that Cockburn Sound Western Australia will offer base and home port facilities to the United States Navy

April

26 April - Louise and Charmian Faulkner disappear from outside their flat in St Kilda, Melbourne, Australia.

30 April – Automotive company Chrysler Australia Limited is taken over by Japanese company Mitsubishi after the American-based Chrysler Corporation sold its Australian subsidiary to the dynamic Japanese automobile manufacturer for \$80 million. The declining fortunes of Chrysler's North American operations forced the sale.

May

15 May – The telecommunications tower on Canberra's Black Mountain is officially opened.

24 May -Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Philip arrive in Australia.

26 May - The High Court of Australia building in Canberra is opened by Queen Elizabeth II. Prince Philip is also in attendance.

31 May – The Royal Commission into Drug Trafficking (Woodward Royal Commission) estimates that there are at least 20,000 heroin addicts in Australia.

June

23 June –

Australia's first "test tube baby" (Candice Reed) is born in Melbourne's Royal Women's Hospital.[1]

26 June – Australian Richard Thorp, of the United States firm Mitchell, Giurgola and Thorp, wins the competition for the design of the new Parliament House, Canberra.

July

I July - Women are allowed to join surf clubs as full members.

4 July - Newcastle's Sun newspaper cease publication.

August

17 August - Nine-week-old Azaria Chamberlain disappears from a campsite at Ayers Rock (Uluru), later confirmed to be taken by a dingo.

AUSTRALIA 1980



September

26 September – The Lonie Report in Victoria recommends the closure of half the suburban rail lines, all country passenger rail lines and a number of tram routes. It also recommends huge freeway expansion. The report is controversial and protests cause its recommendations to be moderated.

30 September – Bob Hawke retires as President of the Australian Council of Trade Unions (ACTU) to contest the seat of Wills in the federal election. Cliff Dolan becomes the new President of the ACTU.

October

- I October The Costigan Royal Commission begins, with the purpose of inquiring into the activities of the Federated Ship Painters and Dockers Union.
- 9 October The standard-gauge railway from Tarcoola to Alice Springs is opened.
- 18 October 1980 Australian federal election: Malcolm Fraser's Liberal/National Country Coalition Government is re-elected with a substantially reduced majority, defeating the Labor Party led by Bill Hayden. The Government also loses control of the Senate, with the Australian Democrats winning the balance of power.

November

29 November – The 1980 Queensland state election takes place with the National Party government of Joh Bjelke-Petersen being reelected.

December

- 2 December The Federal Government lifts controls regulating the interest rates offered by banks on customer deposits.
- 15 December The Azaria Chamberlain inquest begins in Alice Springs.
- 23 December Victoria decriminalises homosexual acts between consenting adults, with the Royal Assent of the Crimes (Sexual Offences) Act 1980.
- 24 December Woolworths' Town Hall store in the centre of Sydney is devastated by a bomb blast the chain's third store to be targeted in nine days. Authorities received only 10 minutes' warning of the bombing, which miraculously caused no serious casualties after 2,000 shoppers and staff were evacuated from the area.
- 26 December Police offer a \$250,000 reward for information relating to the recent Woolworths bombings. The reward is the largest ever offered in Australian history.
- 5 July Evonne Cawley (née Goolagong) wins the Wimbledon singles for the second time, easily beating the popular American champion Chris Evert-Lloyd 6–1, 7–6 in the final. She becomes the first woman to have won the Wimbledon singles nine years apart and is the first mother ever to take tennis' most coveted prize. The reward is the largest ever offered in Australian history.
- 27 September Richmond Tigers (23.21.159) defeat the Collingwood Magpies (9.24.78) to win the 84th VFL premiership. It was the last premiership win for Richmond until 2017.
- 4 November Beldale Ball wins the Melbourne Cup



As I copied and pasted this 1980 list of events it occurred to me how history repeats and where some thing begin. Perhaps you may have similar thoughts as you read through our recent history



Gunner and Percy Westcott

On February 19, 1942 at 10am the Japanese bombed Darwin. During the air raid a six month old Kelpie became trapped beneath a collapsed mess hall on the airbase. He was pulled out by leading Aircraftman Percy Westcott, who saw the dog had a broken leg ande took himn to the army doctor.

The medic would only treat "men" with a name and serial number, so quick thinking Westcott immediately replied this was "Gunner" serial Number 0000. The doctor duly set the leg in plaster and Dismissed the Air Force's newest recruit into the care of the leading Aircraftman Westcott.

Air Raid Warning

Westcott took good care of

Gunner, and within a short time his kindness had unforeseen

Rewards. On this first occasion Gunner started to act strangely,

whining, pacing and refusing to settle. His agitation grew and now

frantic Gunner barked at the skies as some 20 minutes later Japanese warplanes hovered into sight.

Not only that but Gunner repeated his early warning, time and time again. Indeed, hem recognized the difference between the Allied and Japanese planes, only reacting to the laqter. This gave troops valuable time to get their planes airborne or take cover. Indeed, Gunner's early warning was so reliable that Wesrcott was given a portable siren to sound at the first sign of the dog's agitation, and Gunner's sensitive hearing went o9n to save incalculable number of lives.


JUST 4 FUN












One-pan crispy spaghetti and chicken





INGREDIENTS

2 tbs olive oil

Ikg boneless, skin-on chicken thighs (4-6 thighs)

I large onion, chopped to 1cm pieces

3 tbs tomato paste

3 garlic cloves, finely chopped

2 tbs thyme leaves

230g spaghetti, broken into thirds

1/3 lightly packed cup finely grated parmesan (about 25g)

20g fresh breadcrumbs

10g finely chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley

I I/2 tsp lemon zest

I.Heat oven to 220°C. Add I the oil to a large, oven-proof pan with a lid and heat over high heat. Season the chicken with 3/4 tsp salt flakes and I/2 tsp pepper, then add to the hot oil, skin-side down. Cook for 7 minutes, without turning, to brown well.

2. Turn the heat down to medium-high, then stir in the onion and turn over the chicken. Cook for 5 minutes or until the onion has softened and is lightly browned. Add the tomato paste, garlic and I the thyme, and cook, stirring the paste into the onions, for 2 minutes, until fragrant and everything is nicely browned.

3.Add 480ml boiling water, 1/2 tsp salt flakes and 1/4 tsp pepper, then add the spaghetti, stirring to submerge and evenly distribute. Use tongs to lift the chicken pieces so they sit on top of the spaghetti, skin-side up. Bring to a simmer, cover with a lid and transfer to the oven for 30 minutes or until the liquid is absorbed.

4. Meanwhile, mix together the parmesan, breadcrumbs, parsley, lemon zest and remaining I tbs thyme in a small bowl.

5.Remove the pasta from the oven and reset the temperature to a high grill setting. Sprinkle the parmesan breadcrumbs over the pasta and chicken, drizzle with the remaining I tbs oil and return to the centre rack to grill for 3-4 minutes until nicely browned and crisp. Leave to settle for about 5 minutes before serving warm, directly from the pan.



Our little town of Sunbury is going through many changes at the moment, I know some/many of us, myself most vocal about the



Sunbury was first settled in 1836, by George Evans and William Jackson. It was Jackson and his brother, Samuel, who named the township Sunbury, after Sunbury-on-Thames, in Middlesex, England when it was established in 1857. The Post Office opened on 13 January 1858.

Sunbury () is a satellite city located 39 kilometers (24 mi) north-west of Melbourne's central business district, in the state of Victoria, Australia, located within the City of Hume local government area. Sunbury recorded a population of 38,851 at the 2021 census. Statistically, Sunbury is considered part of Greater Melbourne, as per the Victorian government's 2009 decision to extend the urban growth boundary in 2011 to include the area, giving its land urban status and value.
