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

THE GLADSTONE BAG.

Back in 2022 I spotted an old Gladsone Bag on a FaceBook Giveaway group in Sunbury.

The owner had bought the bag for a few dollars and for some reason was under the impression that the previous owner was a Railway employee.

The original owner had written his name on the side and a quick Google check gave me all the information I needed. Why the other fella never did this I have no idea.

The information I was able to find online gave an insight into the man who once used that bag in his daily life.

His name was Norman KOETSVELD. He was born in 1914 in Melbourne and he became an AirForce legend. (my description)

Prior to joining he was a Sales Manager.

Norman enlisted as a trainee mechanic & then became an Armourer & subsequently Air Crew in 1942 completing training in the UK in 1943.

He commenced flying ops to Italy in 1944 with 142 (RAF) Squadron operating from Amendola, in Italy.

There were 2 amazing stories associated with his flying during WW2.

FOUR HUNDRED MILES ON ONE ENGINE.

With only one engine and one wheel, and part of the mainplane damaged, a Wellington bomber flew 400 miles across the sea and made a safe landing.

The Wellington, piloted by Flying Officer Norman KOETSVELD, of the Royal Australian Air Force, was being flown from England to North Africa.

"We were at 5000 feet when the starboard engine overheated", said KOETSVELD. "It blew the starboard tyre, and one cowling and part of the fabric on the mainplane. Then the engine packed up. I opened up the port engine and we just managed to maintain height on the one engine, but we still had 400 miles of sea to cross. I contacted the station by radio, and had the landing field cleared, but I managed to land safely on one engine and one wheel".

But this Wellington's adventures were not yet over. Five days later, when it took off on an air test, both rudders and elevators jammed. KOETSVELD managed to free the elevators, and flew around for an hour and a half while a fitter cut holes in the fabric and tried unsuccessfully to free the rudders. Then the starboard engine failed but the pilot made a landing on one engine with the rudders jammed.

(the above was released to Australian Press from Middle East)

Unfortunately as is often the case in War his luck would not last.

Norman died of injuries when his Wellington bomber XHF537 crashed into high ground near Casteinuovo.

The crew were detailed to attack the Daimler Puch AG Aircraft works in Steyr, Austria.

On that fateful night there were 3 other Wellington Bombers to suffer a similar fate.

Wellington HE584 was abandoned over Corsica, returning from Steyr Austria.

Wellington HE815 crashed in Italy, 3 killed 2 hospitalised.

Wellington HF537 (the subject of this article) crashed in Italy, F/O N KOETSVELD & SGT FOSTER were injured but F/O RUTTER, SGT HOW-ARD & SGT CHURCHER were killed.

F/O KOETSVELD died of his injuries on 4th of March 1944.

All the fatalities were buried in Bari War Cemetery.

The target of the raid was Daimler Puch in Styr, this company used slave labour from concentration camps. War time production includ-small arms, assault rifles, machine guns & aircraft engines.

Once I was aware of the importance of this Gladstone Bag I contactthe RAAF base in Point Cook Victoria.

I received the following reply to my enquiry:

The bag would most certainly be a welcome addition to the Air Force Heritage Collection.

'I commend your generosity & intent to donate the bag to a National Collection for the greater benefit of visitors & researchers alike, as well as in memoriam to the greater sacrifice of FLGOFF KOETSVELD'

A rep came to the house and collected the bag, due to covid the museum was closed so I am yet to see if it has a home here or in the National Collection.

1. On the green @ 9.30. Bell @ 1.00.

2. No pre-game roll-up.

3. No dead ends. Jack positioned on "T".

4. For rounds 1-18, the home team gets the mat. On the distributed fixture rounds 1-9 are correct. Rounds 10-18 teams need to be reversed.

5. If the lead does not legally roll the jack, the opposition skip spots the jack in a legal position and chooses the position of the mat.

70 YEARS ON FROM THE KOREAN WAR

On 27th July, Korean Veterans' Day, we paid tribute to the service of Australians who fought in the Korean War, and marked 70 years since the Armistice was signed to effectively end the conflict.

The Korean War began on 25th June, 1959, when North Korea (People's Democratic Republic of Korea) launched an invasion of South Korea (Republic of Korea) in an attempt to unify the country under its communist government.

Popular public opinion is that only the Army fought in Korea.

Nine Australian Ships altogether were sent to the operational theatres in Korea – *Anzac, Tobruk, Bataan* and *Warramunga* each having two tours of duty, while *Sydney, Culgoa, Condamine, Murchison* and *Shoalhaven* each made an operational tour.

R.A.N. Ships steamed some 463,000 miles and their main armament fired more than 26,000 rounds. R.A.N. Aircraft dropped about 1000 bombs, fired over 300,000 rounds of 20mm. shells and launched many thousands of rockets. A total of 311 Officers and 4196 Sailors served in the area, and thirty-two were awarded decorations.

In October 1951, Australia's first Aircraft Carrier HMAS *Sydney* arrived in Korean waters for a difficult three-month tour of duty through a harsh winter. She carried two squadrons of Sea Furies – 805 and 808 Squadrons RAN and 817 Squadron RAN, equipped with Fireflies. Operating off the East Coast in appalling weather, and launching her aircraft by catapult, *Sydney* survived a typhoon and dispatched 2,700 strikes against North Korean targets in one month for the loss of nine aircraft.



James Crane worked on the 101st floor of Tower 1 of the World Trade Center ... He is blind so he has a golden retriever named Daisy.

After the plane hit 20 stories below, James knew that he was doomed, so he let Daisy go, out of an act of love.

She darted away into the darkened hallway. Choking on the fumes of the jet fuel and the smoke James was just waiting to die. About 30 minutes later, Daisy comes back along with James' boss, Who Daisy just happened to pick up on floor 112 on her first run of the building, she leads James, James' boss, and about 300 more people out of the doomed building.

But she wasn't through yet, she knew there were others who were trapped. So, highly against James' wishes she ran back in the building. On her second run, she saved 392 lives. Again she went back in. During this run, the building collapses.

James hears about this and falls on his knees into tears.

Against all known odds, Daisy makes it out alive, but this time she is carried by a firefighter. "She led us right to the people, before she got injured" the fireman explained.


Her final run saved another 273 lives. She suffered acute smoke inhalation, severe burns on all four paws, and a broken leg, but she saved 967 lives.

Daisy is the first civilian Canine to win the Medal of Honor of New York City.

RECIPE

Convert to Imperial	
375 g	Zucchini (finely grated)
1	Large Onion (finely chopped)
3 rashers	Bacon (finely chopped)
237 mL	Cheddar Cheese (grated)
237 mL	Self-Raising Flour
118.5 mL	Vegetable Oil
5	Eggs
add	Salt (pepper)
add	Parsley Sprig (to garnish)

Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 180°C (160°C fan-forced).
- 2. In a large bowl, combine zucchini, onion, bacon, cheese, sifted flour, oil, and lightly beaten eggs. Season with salt and pepper.
- 3. Pour into a well greased lamington tin (16cm x 26cm).
- 4. Bake for about 30-40 minutes, or until well browned.
- 5. Cut into squares and garnish with parsley, if desired, before serving
