






2023 Poppy Appeal Wrap-up



Greetings everyone and welcome to the 2023 Poppy Appeal wrap-up.

The 2023 Poppy Appeal has concluded and despite the usual (it appears) cold and cloudy start we did not see much rain and finished with some great spring sun. Once again everyone made it safely to the end, although there was a great deal of roster massaging required to get everyone to their doctors appointments.

Many thanks again to those that answered my late night/early morning calls and texts; closing and opening tables and redirecting them to new locations.

Poppy Appeal STATS

When allocating available sellers, safety and support was always the first priority.

We had eight tables for the planned 12 days of sales; plus 2 extra Sundays at Bunnings: 98 table days

We had five instances when tables did not sell due to lack of sellers (last time it was 9): -5 table days

We had one instance of sellers working on a Sun: +1 table day

We had 24 instances where we had only one seller at a location (last time it was 15): 24

We had zero days when all eight tables had 2 sellers - xxxxxx

EFTPOS Machines

We requested two spare EFTPOS machines this time for additional sites (eg factories) and if we needed to swap any out. This proved to be a smart move as one EFTPOS "may" have developed a drinking problem on day 6 and went on strike for the remainder of the appeal. It also allowed for changing sellers and charging options. We will continue with this policy next time.

As a result of battery problems at previous appeals, we purchased 10 Power Packs for this appeal. This proved to be beneficial as a back-up and were used on several occasions; although battery performance overall was better throughout.

We did lose access to the EFTPOS system on 5 Nov due to the OPTUS outage so this may have impacted on our final outcome.

EFTPOS machines accounted for 36% of sales, and for those with a good memory, this is the same as Anzac appeal.

Result

Sellers thought sales were slow throughout the appeal and were not confident of a good result. This is a great result (2nd best all time for Poppy Appeal) and just goes to show how slow and steady wins the race. Combined with the Anzac Appeal, 2023 is the best year on record.

Once again, an example of how generous the people of Sunbury and local area are in supporting the RSL, our veterans and their families. Much of the total raised was because of straight **donations (6%)** from the public.

Thank you to everyone who assisted with sales, both sellers and their support teams; it cannot happen without you. Be proud of your efforts in ensuring Sunbury RSL can continue to provide support to our local veterans and their families.

For now, put your feet up and take a well-earned rest. (*Planning has already started for 2024 as Tony has already requested the dates*)

Remembrance Day at BEAUFORT

At the invitation of the Beaufort RSL Neville Seagrove and I attended the Remembrance Day service at the Beaufort Cenotaph, just off the Western Hwy in the middle of town.

The weather was kind to us, giving the 250 attending townsfolk a clear sunny day of about 22 degrees.

As usual everywhere the President, Don Carnes, led the service and was unconcerned by the sounds of the nearby passing traffic.

The service's speech was given by the Member for Wannon, the Opposition's Defence Minister, Dan Tehan who spoke eloquently at length of history's relevance of today's service.

After the laying of the Official Commemorative Wreaths the public was invited to lay their wreaths and also to lay a proffered Poppy at the Cenotaph.

Needless to say that the response was typical of a country town!!



Everyone then moved a short distance to where the newly restored WW1 German KRUPP 77mm Field Gun was presented to the township

This Gun was one of three captured by Australians during the first Battle of Bullecourt, and as a War Prize was given to Beaufort townsfolk upon the end of WW1.

What really stands out in relation to the Gun's \$70,000 restoration costs was that \$50,000 was donated towards the restoration by



the Ladies of the local RSL Op-Shop!! WOW!!! Now isn't that just typical of Country people!!

Following the service everyone was invited back to the nearby RSL for refreshments.

No "Vultures" swooped on the provided tucker, and good manners were in abundance while all enjoyed the refreshments and chatted amicably.

Neville and I then went to the Cemetery to visit the unmarked grave of Beaufort local William Thomas Buchanan, service number 101 of the First Victorian Contingent sent in 1899 to the Boer War, and whose Boer War Campaign Medal was returned to his hometown by our Sunbury RSL in June this year.

At the gravesite we gratefully acknowledged his service and recited the Ode, then decorated the grave with some Poppies to show that he hadn't been forgotten by a grateful nation.

Neville and I will continue our efforts to have the Australian War graves Commission recognise his service and provide a fitting Headstone for his gravesite, and if that fails, we will do the job ourselves.



HOW TO MAKE NO-BAKE CHRISTMAS SLICE:

First of all crush 2 packets of biscuits in a food processor, don't crush them

too finely as you still want to see some of the biscuit pieces.

Melt the butter, cocoa and brown sugar together in a saucepan. Keep stirring to



dissolve the sugar. Remove from the heat, add the vanilla and milk then stir until combined. In a large mixing bowl combine the crushed biscuits with the chocolate mixture.

Add the mixture to a lined slice tin. Press down with a spatular and push it out to the edges. Smooth out the top with the back of a metal spoon. Chill in the fridge while you make the topping.

Place the white chocolate, oil and peppermint essence in a glass bowl. Microwave in 30 second bursts until the chocolate has almost melted. Remove and stir until completely melted together - the residual heat will melt any last pieces of chocolate. Pour it over the base and smooth to the edges. Put candy canes into a bag and break up with a rolling pin. Sprinkle them over the white chocolate. Scatter over red and green M&Ms.



Chill in the fridge for at least 4 hours until set. Take out of the fridge 20 minutes before cutting into slices (this makes it easier to cut).
